Haworth Highlights

Itinerary Essentials

Take the slow train to Brontë Country for a relaxing break. Stay in Haworth, a nearby village, or the Pennine hills. Visit the Brontë Parsonage Museum to explore the home of Charlotte, Emily and Anne, then wander through the village that inspired their work. Immerse yourself in the unique atmosphere of this historic location.

Top picks for your visit:

- Pop in to the Haworth Old Post Office from where the sisters posted their completed manuscripts
- Enjoy a drink at The Black Bull a favourite watering hole of their brother Branwell Brontë
- Explore St Michael and All Angels Church

 all the Brontë family (apart from Anne)
 are buried here at the parish church where
 Patrick Brontë was vicar for 41 years
- Bring a picnic and enjoy the panoramic views of Parsons Field just steps from the Parsonage

Stay and explore:

- Check out the latest exhibition at Cliffe Castle Museum
- Book your tickets this summer for a unique performance of the Railway Children on the Keighley and Worth Valley Railway
- From delicious pub grub to the best curries and elegant afternoon teas, you'll find some fantastic dining choices around Haworth and Brontë Country
- Join the Haunted Haworth Ghost Walk for a spine-tingling adventure through the village's ghostly spots!





Walk to Top Withens


Start your walk to Top Withens in Stanbury, for a 4.5-mile walk that takes you across the famous Brontë moors. The route passes a number of locations with Brontë connections, including Penistone Crag – thought to have been a favourite haunt of the Brontës, and described by Emily Brontë in Wuthering Heights as the meeting place of Cathy and Heathcliff, and Ponden Hall, renamed by Emily as Thrushcross Grange.

The ruined farmhouse Top Withens is one of the most iconic locations in Brontë Country. Situated on top of the windswept moorland, it is said to have been the inspiration for the Earnshaw family house in Wuthering Heights.

This walk is suitable for most reasonably fit occasional walkers, and is best enjoyed as a full day's activity. Dress for the outdoors, including comfortable boots, take a map and don't forget your packed lunch!

Haworth and Keighley are 3.5 miles apart and are connected by a regular bus service, Brontë Bus B1, B2, B3. You can check timetables in advance, online at:

01 Brontë Parsonage Museum

This elegant Georgian house was home to the Brontë sisters and is furnished with their possessions, evoking the atmosphere of their time.

The KWVR heritage railway runs from Keighley to Oxenhope through Brontë Country, offering vintage steam train journeys and events year-round.

Haworth is easily reached by bus from Keighley and Hebden Bridge, with train links via Keighley with Bradford, Leeds and **Skipton.** Parking includes several pay-and-display car parks. including West Lane by the museum and a coach park off Sun Street. There is a Clean Air Zone in Bradford, with no charges for passenger cars.



What's On in Haworth?

Haworth hosts year-round events, from the Steampunk Weekend and Beer & Music Festival at the Keighley & Worth Valley Railway to the Brontë Festival of Women's Writing. December brings special celebrations, and with Bradford named UK City of Culture 2025, even more exciting events are on the way.
